## IRRIGATION DISTRICT



On Thursday, May 8<sup>th</sup>, 2025, at 8:30 A.M. the Greenfields Irrigation District (GID) held its Monthly Board meeting. The following are the minutes taken from that meeting. Those in attendance were: Board President Tim Brunner, Vice President Bill Norris, Commissioners Chase Brady, Dave Gulick. And Pat Brosten. District Manager Erling Juel and Board Secretary Jenny Gulick were also present. Also, in attendance were: GID employees, Cory Copenhaver, Tony May and Steve Lettengarver. Chris Ostberg on the Advisory Board was present, along with water users: Mark McInerney, Ryan McInerney and Tony Clark. Jason Hahn with the Bureau of Reclamation was in attendance, along with Tracy Wendt with SRWG.

The meeting was called to order by President Brunner at 8:37 A.M. President Brunner reminded the group that public comment would be accepted but held to a maximum of 5 minutes per individual.

The first item of business was to Reorganize the Board. Manager Juel took over presiding over until the Board was reorganized. Pat Brosten asked Tim if he was interested in continuing as the President. Tim explained that he would like to continue as Board President if the other commissioners would like him to. Commissioner Gulick nominated Tim to continue as Board President and Vice President Norris seconded. There were no other nominations, so Tim was appointed President by acclamation. The next item of business was to appoint a new Board Vice President. Bill Norris chose not to run for the Board another term and so Chris Ostberg was appointed to the Board, as he had no one opposing him. Commissioner Brosten nominated Chase to be Vice President and Commissioner Gulick seconded. All were in favor and the Board VP was assigned to Chase. Manager Juel then asked for a nomination for Board Secretary. Commissioner Brosten nominated Jenny Gulick to continue as Board Secretary and Commissioner Brady seconded. All were in favor and Gulick was appointed to continue as Secretary. GID staff and the Board members then thanked Bill Norris for his 20 years of service and presented him with a parting gift. Manager Juel then handed the meeting back over to President Brunner.

**Board to Approve Meeting Minutes and Monthly Warrants:** The next item of business was to approve the minutes from the April 10<sup>th</sup> Regular Meeting. There were no discrepancies found in the Regular Minutes and Commissioner Brady made a motion to approve the minutes and Commissioner Gulick seconded the motion. All in favor and the Minutes were approved. The Board then reviewed the April warrants. It was explained that the warrant for Jon's Automotive was to replace the electric power steering in one of the ditch rider trucks. Manager Juel explained to the Board that we would not be paying the Rubicon bill, so the Board could disregard that warrant. Commissioner Brosten made a motion to approve the warrants and Commissioner Gulick seconded. All were in favor and the warrants were approved.

**Contacts to Execute:** Board President is to sign the Collective Bargaining Agreement after the Board had time to review the contract. Manager Juel explained that the Teamsters Representative had sent the agreement to his supervisors for approval before he had an opportunity to review and amend it.

President Brunner pointed out that the duration of the contract dates were not updated and as so, are incorrect. Commissioner Brosten made a motion to table this item until the dates can be corrected, and Vice President Brady seconded. All were in favor and the item was tabled.

**Parties Presenting Issues:** None.

**Manager's Report:**

**Reservoir and River Operations:** See M.R. for full details. Reservoir and River Operations: Snowpack is currently 48.5% of normal. Willow Creek and Gibson Reservoirs are historically low, which is slightly troubling, but Pishkun is at normal levels. We are tracking along the same lines as last year's conditions. The National Climate Prediction is above-normal temps and well below normal precipitation for May through July, with August through October expected to see above normal temps and below normal precipitation. Last year was the first time in a very, very long time that Gibson didn't fill completely.

**Water Rights:** No update.

**GID Staff Updates:** The spray crew has now all been filled, the mower guy is back for the season and the ditch rider roster is full, as well. The office seasonal employees have been hired and will begin shortly. Manager Juel explained that there is a young engineer in the area who is interested in SCADA and learning what GID uses it for and could potentially use if for if implemented. He explained that we could use the SCADA \$30k planning grant to cover his pay.

**Office Improvements & General Administration:** We still need 2 new computers and new GIS software.

**GIS Mapping, Plats, Database & Certification Updates:** We have received about half of the producer's certification paperwork back. Spencer Pearson called to arrange a time for him to come in and certify where both Nancy and Manager Juel could be present.

**Farm Unit Operations:** No farm unit changes or new pivot installations for the Board's information.

**Monthly Financials & 2025 Budget:** See the M.R. for further details regarding accounts receivable and payable for April. Manager Juel will have an updated Budget for the Board's review at next month's meeting.

**GID Vehicles & Heavy Equipment:** We will need to replace two of the ditch rider trucks this Fall. The brakes are now starting to act up on the lowboy trailer. One of the excavators and the fleet of dump trucks will need to be replaced soon. The Volvo truck that had continuous issues that couldn't be repaired will be swapped out with the loaner and titles exchanged.

**Spencer Pearson Lawsuit:** The Human Rights Bureau complaint investigator interviewed Manager Juel yesterday afternoon with Steph and the attorney assigned by the insurance company. There was a hearing in Choteau at the courthouse to hear oral arguments regarding GID's motion to dismiss for lack of standing. There was a good showing of GID's membership. Manager Juel is requesting that our counsel give the Board an update at next month's meeting during an Executive Session.

**Willow Creek Feeder Canal Maintenance & Lawsuit:** See the M.R. for further details. The Trial is scheduled for October 20<sup>th</sup>-31<sup>st</sup>. We still have a couple of motions pending in District Court regarding the insurance dec action.

**Hydro Updates:** General: See the M.R for details. Transmission Design & Construction: The contractor has returned to finish the river crossing and to hang wire on the south side of the river. He will likely be shut down from April 15<sup>th</sup> to July 15<sup>th</sup> due to local bird nesting season. Power Purchase Agreement: A phone call is scheduled with a Representative of the Southwest Power Pool on Friday at 7 A.M. Basin has agreed to buy our power, but more details are still needed. There is over a year until we can begin to generate energy, so we have a little time to iron out the details. Construction: The turbines were set in early April. Next, we need to start building the powerhouse walls. WEEG WaterSmart Grant: We submitted the semi-annual grant reports. Transmission Easements: BLM has requested a progress meeting next Monday. The cultural resources study has been amended and finalized, and the wetlands notification has been sent off, as well.

**GID Infrastructure Projects:** For Current and Planned, see the M.R. Mary Taylor Facility: We are still finalizing the PER and are working under a \$30k planning grant. We submitted a \$4.4 million CDS request (Congressional Directed Spending) through Senator Sheehy's office and submitted a similar request to Rep. Downing's office. Willow Creek Spillway Repair: We need to finalize the project costs and finances. Manager Juel is working with Jason with the BOR regarding GID's repayment contract. Sun River Bridge Replacement: The construction continues, and they are now pile driving for intermediate bents and casting the pile caps. Jason with the BOR gave a brief overview of the progress. Tunnel #3: Manager Juel still needs to review the repayment contract with the BOR. The only issue of concern is the requirement for GID to keep a reserves account open. Manager Juel will work with our local bank shortly to establish a line of credit that will serve as an accessible reserves account. We are holding off on the 2<sup>nd</sup> phase of construction until after the water season and another review of the work can be done. We will continue to put pressure on the contractor to inform us how they intend to fix the issues currently found. Pishkun Outlet: A design charette consisting of 9 BOR experts was held in April to discuss replacement and rehab options. We should expect to see a summary by the end of June.

**O&M Projects and Update:** A portion of the chute wall on the Lower Turnbull Drop failed. Manager Juel gave a brief overview of the remedies planned to fix the chute. SRS Canal: Concrete lining a portion of the structure will need to be done this Fall.

**Title Transfer:** Nothing new to report.

**GID Grazing Lease Program:** GID Range Rider Wilson was not present, but Manager Juel explained that we are getting geared up for inspection season. A concern with one of the grazing pastures is brought up and reported that there may be an overgrazing issue on it and we should have Ron double check the AUMs allowed.

**FCA Efforts to Modernize GID Infrastructure:** There has been a hold on the bi-weekly meeting held with the FCA and GID staff due to pending concerns with NRCS funding of the FCA's efforts.

**Groundwater Study with MBMG:** On-going scoping and data collection discussions with MBMG staff regarding the Greenfields Bench Groundwater Study. The Town of Fairfield wants to drill a well

over by the ball fields and have submitted a request to Reclamation, as they are struggling to find places to drain their aquifer.

**Short and Long-Term To-Do Lists:** See the M.R. for details.

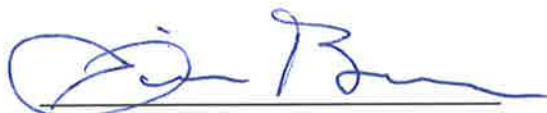
**Agenda:**

- 1) Board to review and approve the language suggested by our counsel that should be added to GID's Board Policies to include the adoption of the 2024 Resolution, attachment. After review, Commissioner Gulick made a motion to approve the addition of the language to policy and Commissioner Brosten seconded. All in favor and the motion carried.
- 2) Board to discuss and decide on a start date for the 2025 water season. It will take a week to 10 days to top-off Pishkun. There are 4 days of rainy, cold weather forecasted for next week. We will start up the PSC on Monday and begin filling Pishkun. We will start out of Gibson on the 16<sup>th</sup> if there is no rain but will hold off until the 18<sup>th</sup> if it does rain. We will go to a 5-day work week starting the 19<sup>th</sup>. Last year we never filled Willow Creek or Gibson. We will need at least 3-4 days of filling Pishkun before we can start bringing it down to the project. We will discontinue filling Willow Creek once Gibson has begun its annual draw down. Brief discussion of FSID's intended start-up date and GID's responsibility to put water down the river.

**Public Comment:** Tracy Wendt with SRWG gave a brief update but had no handout. The consultant went out for his initial inspection and will be working with FSID to install a new gauge. The Give Great Falls fundraiser with matching donations was a success and \$7,800 was raised. Muddy Creek: The Engineer began scoping for restoration, stream and bank and are 50% done with the design work. There will be a meeting with FSID, Broken O, Bureau of Rec, GID and SRWG to discuss river operations. The GID Board is welcome to sit in at the meeting. Manager Juel did a good job defending GID's operations to the FWP at the last Water Management meeting.

Next month's meeting will be on Tuesday, June 10<sup>th</sup> at 6 P.M.

Vice President Brady moved to adjourn the meeting and Commissioner Brosten seconded. All in favor and the meeting is adjourned at 10:49 A.M.

**1) RESERVOIR & RIVER OPERATIONS AND PROJECTIONS AS OF 05/08/25**

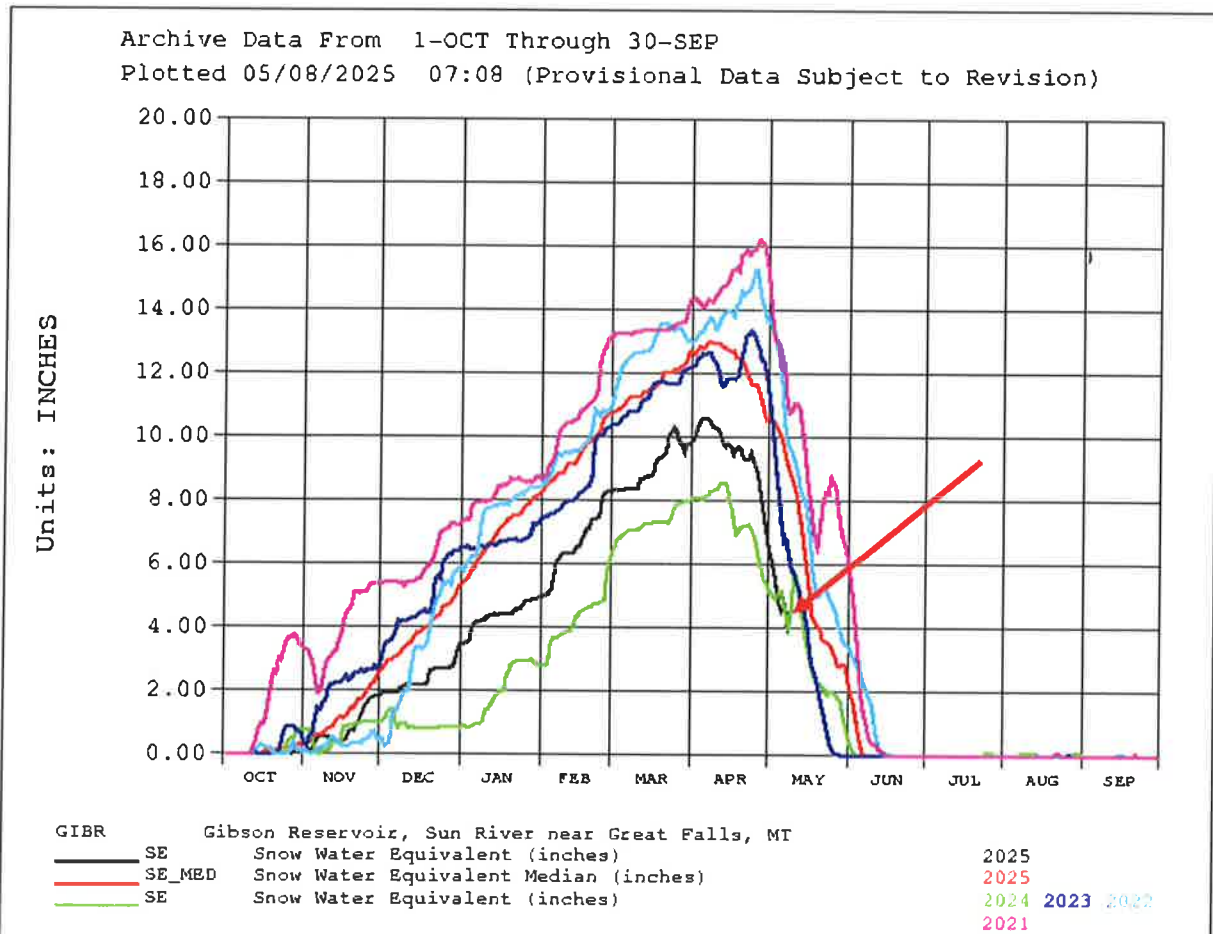
A. Reservoir operations and levels over the last 5 days were:

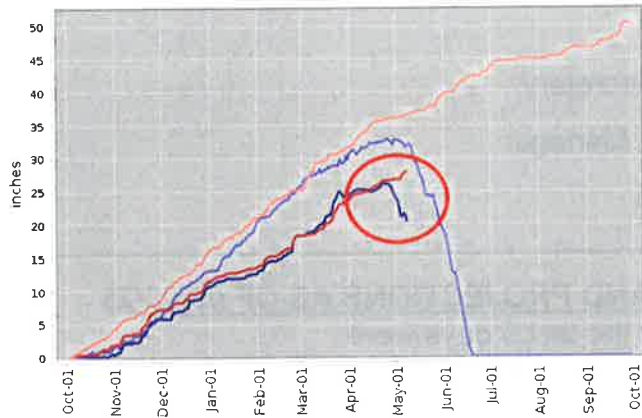
- Gibson Res: 52,000 Ac-ft, 52% Full & 86% of Normal,
- Gibson Inflows: varying from 1400 to 2000 cfs, 70% to 125% of Normal,
- Gibson Outflows: 270 to 285 cfs,
- Willow Creek Reservoir: 16,900 Ac-ft, 53% Full, 65% of Normal
- Willow Creek Inflows: 70 to 90 cfs

B. Snowpack Levels readings are:

- Badger Pass Snow-Water Eq. = 20.4"
- Mount Lockhart Snow-Water Eq. = 10.2"
- Waldron Snow-Water Eq. = 1.3"
- Wood Creek Snow-Water Eq. = 0.0"
- Gibson Reservoir Watershed = 4.5", 48.5% of normal per (USBR)

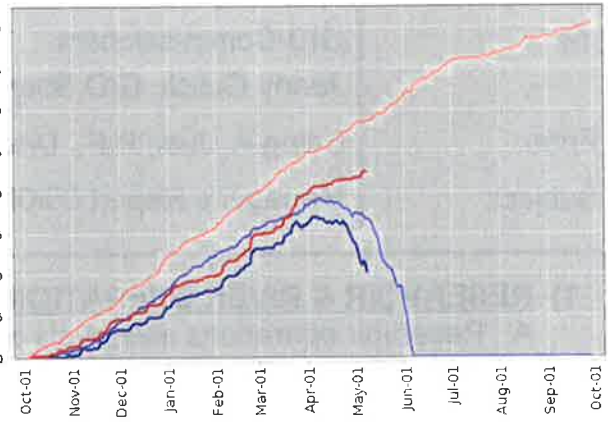

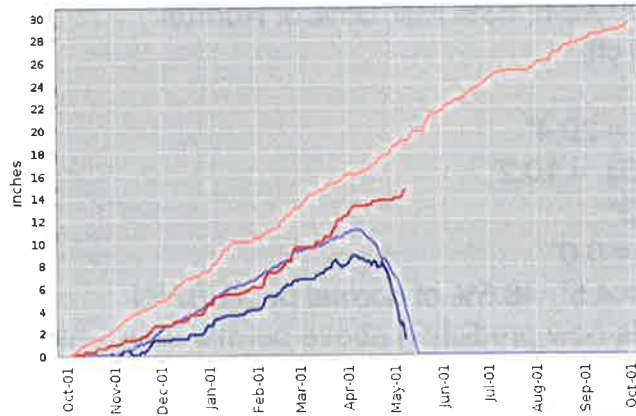


**BADGER PASS**

(snow-water equivalent)

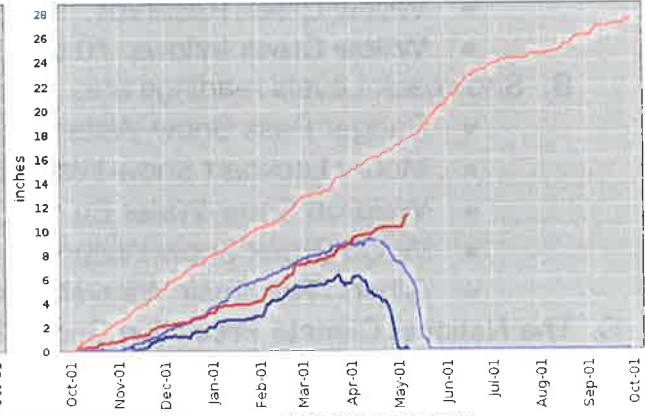


**MOUNT LOCKHART**

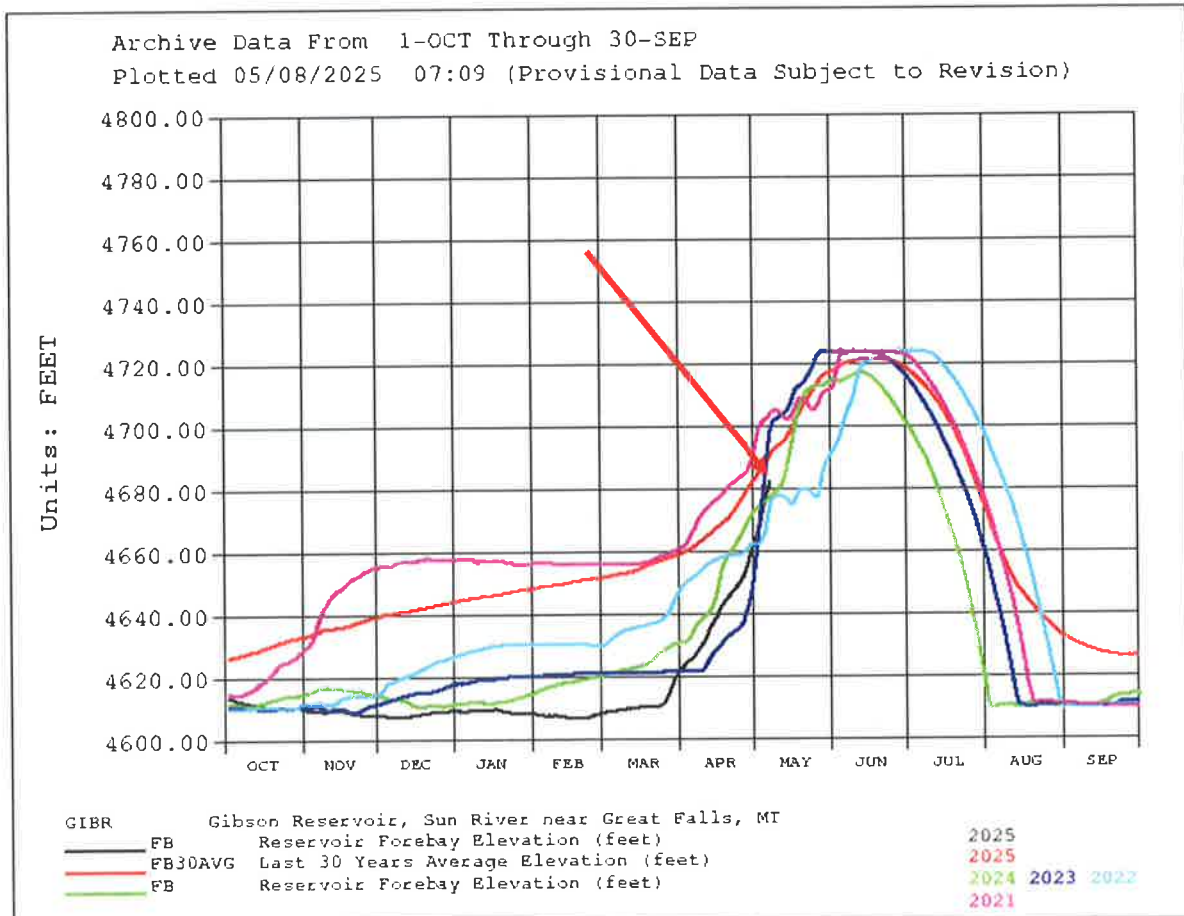


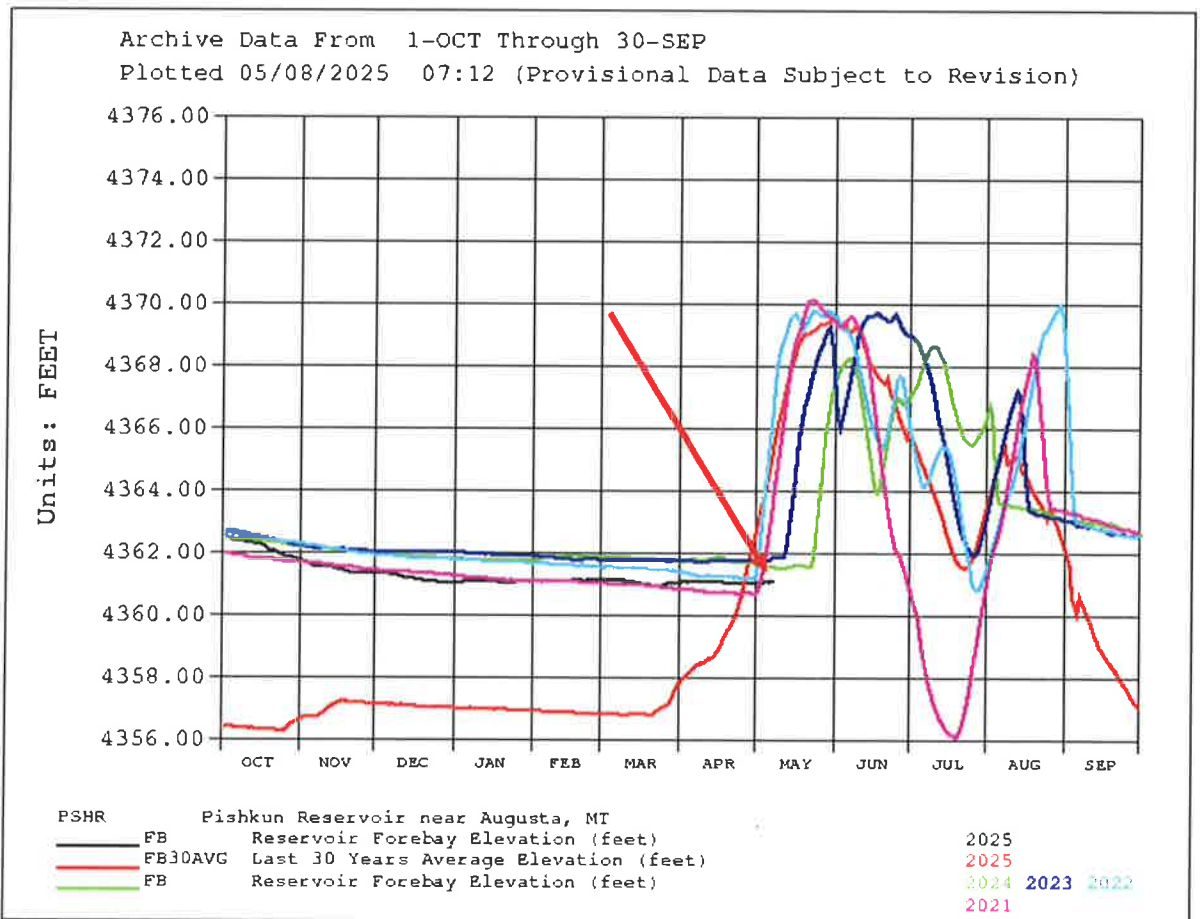
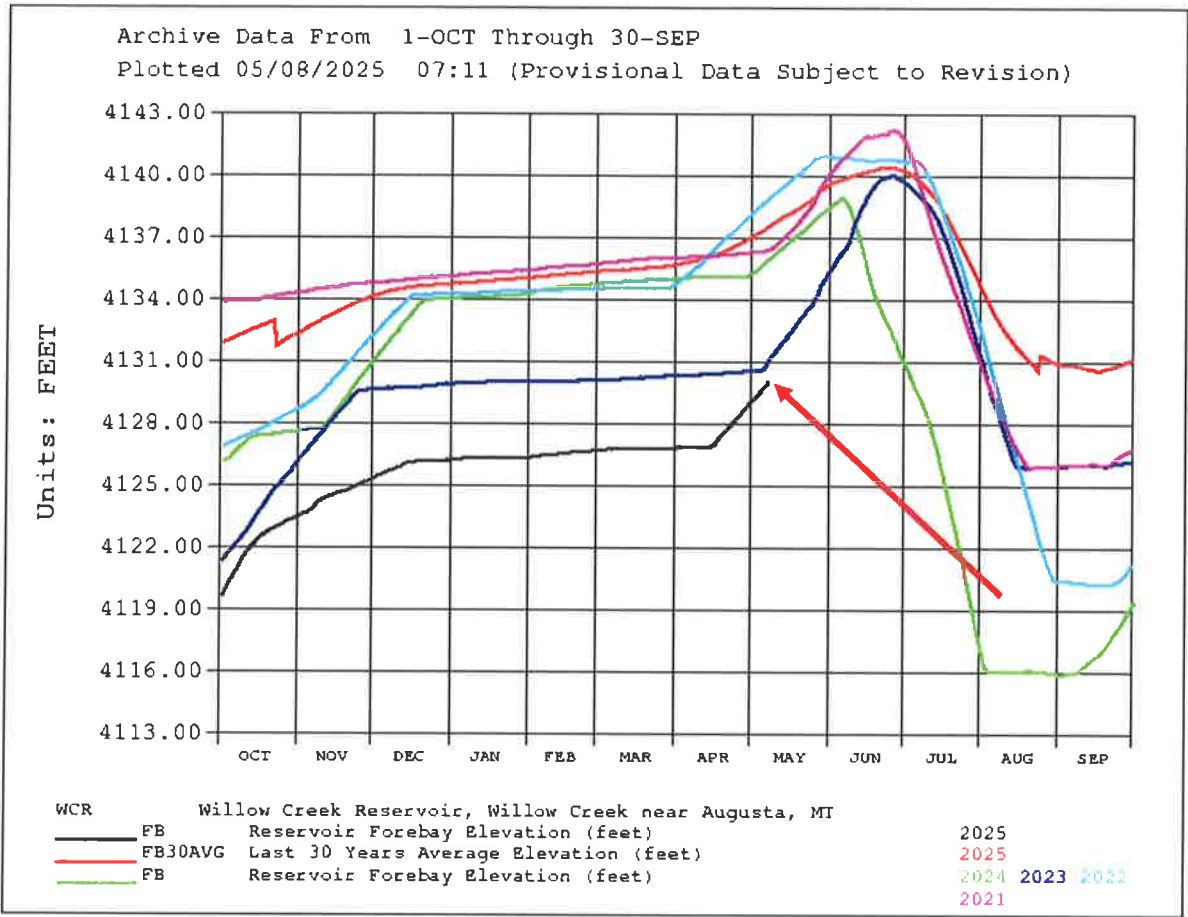

(total precipitation)

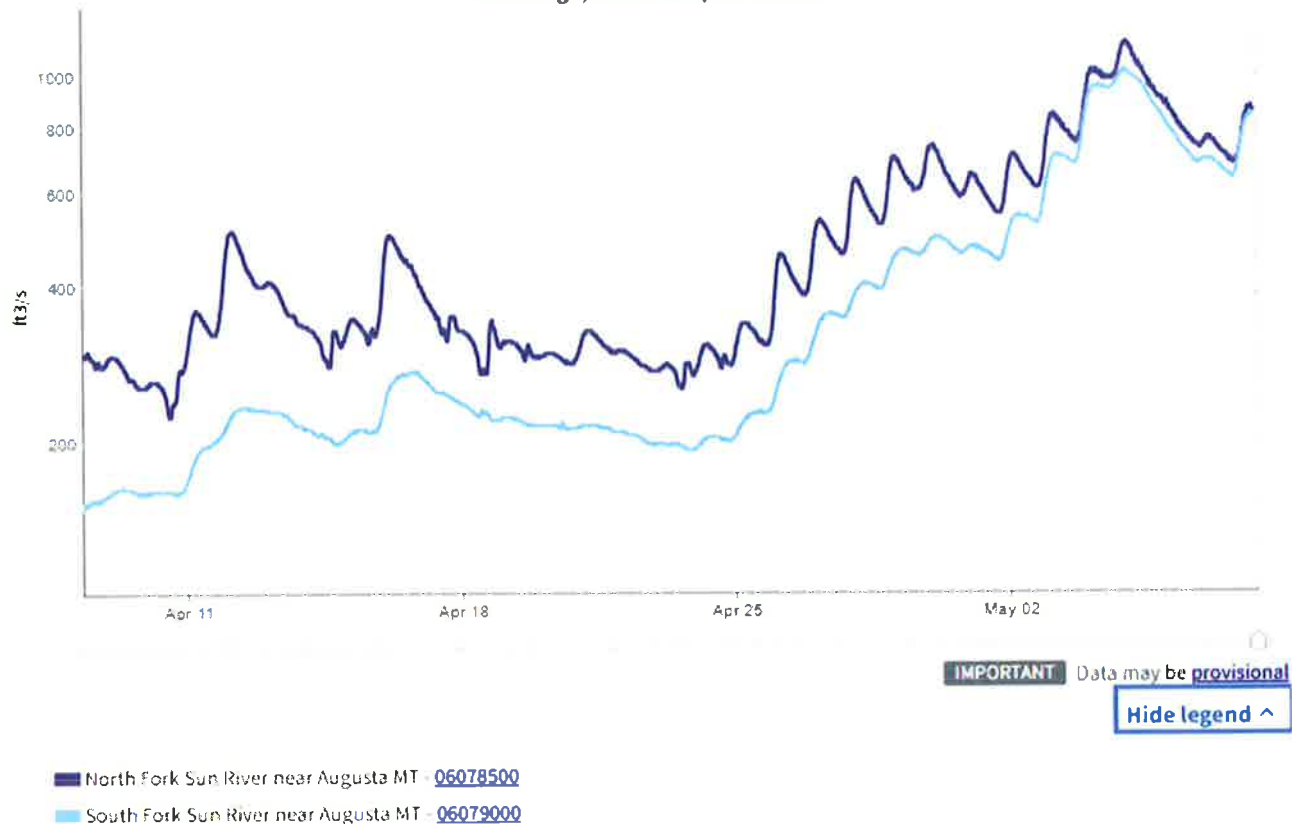

In summary.....

1. Gibson inflows hovering around normal for this time of year.
2. Snowpack is quickly declining, faster than last year and the 30-year average.
3. The WCFC operation is still continuing. Willow Creek Reservoir is similar to last year at this time.
4. In short, the snow pack, reservoir levels, and predicted summer weather patterns indicate conditions similar to last year.
5. 12 inch allotment with no excess water and little chance of half rate water remains prudent and likely

E. Eric will give us an update on the **Final Chapter** of the on-going Volvo tractor-trailer saga.

A. I was interviewed by a complaint investigator with the Human Rights Bureau on Wednesday. The interview was conducted remotely by the investigator and attended by our attorneys.

B. Attended a hearing in Choteau Courthouse for oral arguments regarding GID's motion to dismiss for lack of standing. The Judge, out of Park County, attended remotely. Good showing of GID's membership in attendance.

C. Insurance carrier has agreed to provide defense coverage on the HRB case. They have appointed counsel out of Billings. No decision regarding tendering a defense on the District Court case.

**11) HYDRO UPDATES**

A. General – Regarding GID's fight with NWE's intent to update the QF-1 Tariffs.

1. Awaiting a decision from the Public Service Commission.

B. Arnold Coulee LOPP – Still hoping to be on-line Spring of 2026.

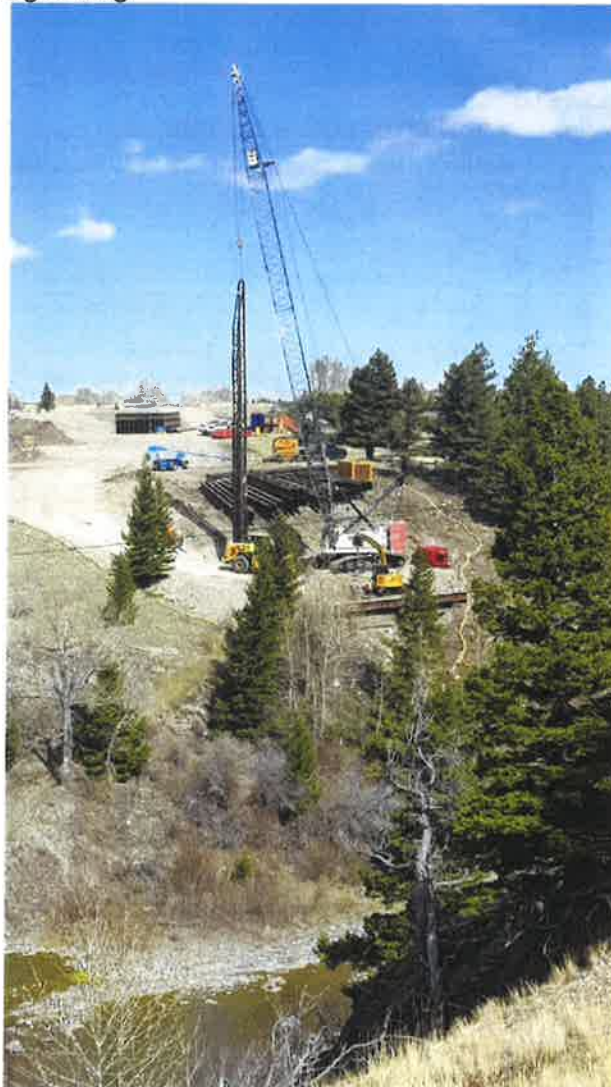
1. **Transmission Design & Construction –**

- Little has occurred regarding the construction of the Arnold Coulee transmission leg since September 2024. The Contractor has returned to finish the river crossing and hang wire on the south side of the river. Concerns about the construction restrictions between April 15<sup>th</sup> and July 15<sup>th</sup> which were imposed to address local bird nesting season.
- 2. **Transmission Easements** –
  - A switchyard easement on State land west of Jackson's Corner is still pending PPA and wheeling requirements.
- 3. **SREC Interconnection & Transmission Agreements** – Nothing new regarding this work. Awaiting finalization of the PPA.
- 4. **Power Purchase Agreement** – Negotiations with NWE & WAPA are slow.
  - A phone call is scheduled with representatives of Southwest Power Pool (SPP) on Friday morning at 7am. **Any commissioners want to listen?**
  - Still researching other possible buyers. News from Doug Hardy?
- 5. **WEEG WaterSmart Grant** –
  - Submitted the semi-annual grant reports.
- 6. **Construction** – Good Progress in March and April.
  - The turbines were set and leveled in early April.
  - Next, we need to start building the powerhouse walls.
  - Regarding the resumption of progress, crews will be working closer to Fairfield doing work to get ready for the water season.
  - WRT tariffs, we need to consider the impact taking delivery of generators.
- C. Pishkun Inlet Hydro – **NEPA and NHPA are the critical paths.**
  1. **Funding** – The reauthorized \$1.5 Million low-interest, DNRC loan, available after July 1<sup>st</sup>, once the NEPA documents have been completed and the BLM ROW has been secured, has been sent onto the Governor's desk for signing.
  2. **WEEG WaterSmart Grant** – Submitted the semi-annual grant reports.
  3. **LOPP** – Reclamation to initiate the Final LOPP for this site soon after the Arnold Coulee site kicks loose. This includes the NEPA & NHPA process.
  4. **Transmission Easements** –
    - The ROW request application from BLM has been submitted to BOR & BLM. There will be a progress meeting with BLM next Monday.
    - The amended Cultural Resources report was finalized and submitted to BOR and BLM. Nothing new was revealed in the revised report.
    - A wetlands notification has been submitted to the USCOE.
  5. **Transmission Design & Construction** – Design mostly done, construction has yet to start.
  6. **Power Purchase Agreement** – **Have not started this task.**
  7. **Design Drawings** – Received updated preliminary drawings.
  8. **Turbine-Generator Fabrication** – Turbines all paid for. Draft tubes on site.
